

Prof. Edward Taylor

Emeritus Professor at Penn State University, where he taught Continuing Education and Adult Education. As a professor, he has authored numerous publications on transformative learning theory and on teaching strategies that facilitate change. Recognizing the importance of these strategies for higher education faculty, he has worked internationally and at various Italian universities with instructors from diverse disciplines, focusing on innovative teaching practices (Active Learning) that promote teaching for change.

Prof. Jon Wright

He is a teacher, trainer, and educational consultant with over 35 years of experience. He has authored more than 20 textbooks and reference books for publishers such as Oxford University Press, Heinle, DELTA Publishing, dtv, Cornelsen, and Harper Collins Cobuild. His research interests include active learning, innovative teaching methods, student autonomy, instructional material design, and Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL).

She is an Associate Professor of Experimental Pedagogy at the University of Florence, where she teaches Methods of Design and Evaluation for Education.
