We understand that managers need to sufficiently resource their teams to ensure quality services are delivered which is why, where there is a quantifiable need for additional or continuing support, there is a process in place for managers to make a case to recruit, retain or extend temporarily contracted employees.

GALLERY GUIDE PROGRAM

The Gallery Guide program is a paid opportunity for Yale undergraduates to develop and lead interactive, close-looking gallery tours for the public. Students participate in a yearlong training program to learn about the collection and how to lead inclusive conversations around works of art.

Admitted students meet with museum staff twice per week in the fall and spring semesters, learning about the collection from multiple perspectives. Throughout the year, students research, write, and rehearse unique thematic gallery tours, which they debut in April. Trainees collaborate with student groups at other university museums as well as take field trips to other regional museums, such as Dia Beacon, MASS MoCA, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. The in-depth training requires a time commitment similar to that of an academic course. Following the completion of the first year of training, students remain involved with the Gallery Guide program by giving thematic highlights tours (for which they receive payment), developing new approaches to presenting the collection, and participating in continued weekly training sessions.

The Club Sports program at Yale University was initiated about 70 years ago by Edward C.Migdalski, a national leader and pioneer in the club sports concept. The Athletic Department then recognized only seven "Minor Sports" -- Fishing, Pony Polo, Riflery, Rugby, Sailing, Skiing, and Trap Shooting. Ed's first accomplishment was to officially change the program name from "Minor Sports" to "Club Sports" for he believed "there is no such thing as a minor sport."

The program has since grown from seven to about 50 clubs, one of the largest in the nation. Although some club sports are solely recreational, most are highly competitive. National collegiate championships have been won by Basketball, Croquet, Cycling, Fishing, Polo, Rugby, Sailing, Skeet Shooting, and Wrestling. In 1976, Brad Simmons, captain of the Yale Skeet and Trap team, was the first civilian shotgun shooter in 20 years to make the U.S. Olympic Team.

Additionally, numerous individual national championships have been won in a variety of club sports. The Yale William Clay Ford Club Sports program has a long, respected, and proud tradition at Ivy League, national, and international levels. We expect that tradition to continue and strengthen. Many of the buildings in St Andrews are set in extensive grounds with long paths and driveways. Always approach the building with care, especially after dark. If the paths are poorly lit, consider carrying a torch. A personal alarm may also prove useful. These are available from Student Services or the General Office in the Students Association Union Building.

Also, residents should be alert at all times. Don't leave your room unlocked when you go out or even when you use the kitchen or bathroom (and ask your room mates to do the same).

Never leave cash or valuables on open view in your room, keep them out of sight. If possible, limit the amount of jewellery, electrical equipment, and personal effects that you bring with you to St Andrews.

When you leave the building, always close and lock the main entrance doors to your Halls of Residence, if this facility exists. Try to avoid anyone going in with you unless you know him or her.

Be aware of strangers around the corridors of your buildings. Report any suspicious activity to the Warden, Sub Wardens, and Porters or to the Police.

The American Institute of Chemical Engineers (AIChE) is a professional organization for chemical engineers. AIChE was established in 1908 with the purpose of establishing chemical engineers as a profession independent from chemists and mechanical engineers. Its mission is to promote excellence in the Chemical Engineering Department of the School of Engineering and Applied Science by providing resources and support to the undergraduate students so that they can succeed academically and advance professionally.

In 1908 a small group of chemical engineers formed a professional society to promote and improve chemical engineering as a discipline. At first, the American Institute of Chemical Engineers (AIChE) met with strong resistance, especially from the American Chemical Society (ACS), which claimed control over all pure and applied chemistry in the United States. The value of AIChE was realized in 1925, when chemical engineering became the first profession to use scholastic accreditation to ensure the consistency and quality of academic chemical engineering courses. Peace was made between ACS and AIChE around 1930.

Today AIChE remains the principal chemical engineering professional society in the United States. Currently about 57,000 (~70%) of American chemical engineers are members.

From UCLA's earliest rituals to its most recent ones, students, alumni and friends have been honoring and contributing to Bruin traditions. Some UCLA traditions can be traced to the early 1920s, when the campus was known as the Southern Branch of the University of California. While some of the early traditions have evolved over time and remain strong today, others have faded away.

School Colors

Like those of the University of California, UCLA's colors are blue and gold. The university's colors were chosen to represent the state's various attributes: Blue to symbolize the ocean, and local wildflowers. Yellow to reflect the Golden State, the California poppy and sunsets. Of course, the shades have changed over the years. The blue, for example, has varied from powder to sky to royal.

The Big C

Because of UCLA's origins with Cal, many Berkeley elements influenced the UCLA campus. In 1939, for example, students inlaid the "Big C," a giant cement letter "C" for California, into the hillside where Sproul Hall now stands. In 1960, "Big C junior," slightly smaller in size than its predecessor, was built on the bluff below Sproul Hall, now the site of Drake Stadium.

Disabled student experience in the International Programmes is reassuringly positive, although further research should be undertaken with dormant or dropped/withdrawn students.

Further analysis should also be made of the retention of disabled students in the Programmes, especially as evidence from other institutions suggests their dropout rates may be markedly higher than for non-disabled students.

The challenges of students' studies are very varied and depend on the very different disabilities experienced by students. A number of students experience more than one disability which increases their challenge even more.

The benefits of distance education are the flexibility and ability to study from home without needing to travel.

The disadvantages are their isolation from other students and their teachers and the institution itself.

It would be helpful to find ways of diminishing that isolation.

Around 20% of disabled students state that their disability was the main factor in choosing the International Programmes. But even for them the brand of London University and the choice of appropriate courses were still very important.

A core aspect of living systems is their ability to adapt to their environment and to environmental change.
